Reed Thomason Mural Characters

July 24, 1979

Re-collected June 13, 2017



In 1978, a sixty foot mural, painted by Cleveland resident and Cleveland Institute of Art graduate Reed Thomason, was installed in the Children's Room. Characters from classical and children's literature are depicted in this exquisite painting.

In 1979, Library staff undertook to identify, describe, and annotate the characters depicted in the mural. This annotation, in its original form and order, follows.

MURAL CHARACTERS

1. Mephistopheles

comes possibly from Greek meaning not loving light or Hebrew meaning destroyer and liar the character appears in Shakespeare's Merry Wives Medieval legend-deyil to whom Faustus sold his soul.

2. Merlin

This character in Arthurian legend is sometimes linked to Myrddin in Welsh legend.

10th century - Geoffrey of Monouth used a 9th century Welsh legend to make Merlin advisor to Uther Pendragon-<u>Historia regum Britannia</u>

10th century - Libellus told of Merlini, a Celtic druid who moved Stonehenge from Ireland to Amesbury, England-English

13th century - Robert de Borron added Christianity to the tale and made Merlin a prophet of the Holy Grail in Merlin-English

? 15th century - Thomas Malory-Morte D'Arthur-French

19th century - Alfred Lord Tennyson's-Idylls of the King-English. Tennyson inspired Dante Gabriel Rossetti to paint Arthurian legend

20th century - T. H. White's-Book of Merlyn-English

3. Goethe-

full name is Johann Wolfgang von Goethe. He was born on August 28, 1749 in Frankfurt am Main of middle class German parents. Goethe is known as one of the giants in world literature, but was a scientist as well as literary figure. Wrote <u>Faust</u> at the end of his life, completing Faust I in 1808. Goethe died in Weimer, Germany on March 22, 1832.

4. Tiger The Long and the Tigor - Stockton (cleck) for William Blake's poem-"Tiger, Tiger, Burning Bright" comes from his Songs of Experience. 18th century-English. Blake's collection was written to celebrate the mystery and triumph of creation.

19th century - Johanna Spyri-German translated from German 1881 20th century - film starring Shirley Temple-film made for T.V.

6. Princess, her lover, king

19th century - Frank Stockton-short story.

This was originally called <u>The King's Arena</u> and was read at a friend's party. Century Magazine published it and it became their most popular story. Stockton never answered the question of which door was chosen.

Traplated the loter

7. <u>Little Match Girl</u>

19th century - Hans Christian Anderson-short story.
This first appeared in <u>Dansk Folkekalender</u>. The story was written at the request of publisher Mr. Flinch and was taken from a drawing by J. T. Lundbye of a poor girl selling matches.

8. <u>Cyrano de Bergerac</u>

19th century - Edmond de Rostand-play.

The character was based on an actual person who lived in 17th century France. Was a soldier, satirist and dramatist and was known for his long nose.

20th century - film starring Jose Ferrer

9. <u>Dorothy</u>, <u>Tinman</u>, <u>Scarecrow</u>

1903-1st edition of L. Frank Baum's Wizard of Oz

1908-handpainted movie of book

1939- $\underline{\text{Wizard}}$ of $\underline{\text{Oz}}$ movie with Judy Garland. Dorothy was not someone Baum knew, just a name he liked.

The Tinman was a copy of a display in a hardware store window designed by Baum.

10. Mad Hatter

1865-Alice's Adventures in Wonderland-book-Lewis Carroll-English

1933-movie-Edward Everett Horton as Hatter

1951-Disney's film-Ed Wynn was voice of the Hatter

The Mad Hatter was drawn to resemble Theophilus Carter, a furniture dealer near Oxford. He was known as the Mad Hatter-wore a top hat and was eccentric.

11. <u>Icabod Crane</u>

1819-Washington Irving-book of essays-The Sketch Book, "The Legend of Sleepy Hollow." The essays were taken from Irvings knowledge of the Dutch American community.

12. Three Blind Mice

1609-Thomas Ravenscroft, editor-book.

This version was found in "Pleasant Roundelaus" a part of <u>Deuteromelia</u> or <u>The Seconde Part of Musicks Melodie</u>.

1842-first appeared in children's literature introduced by James

0 Halliwell.

13. Don Quixote

1605-Miguel de Cervantes Savaadra-book-Spanish 1959-James Reeves-retelling-<u>Exploits</u> of <u>Don</u> <u>Quixote</u>-American 1966-became a musical stage production as Man of La Mancha The full title of Cervates book was El Ingeniojo Hidalgo Don Quixote de la Mancha.

14. Hiawatha

1855-Henry Wadsworth Longfellow-poem-American. Longfellow was influenced by Henry Rowe Schoolcraft who wrote on Indian legend and religion. Hiawatha was an Oyibway indian.

15. Bottom, Titania, Puck

1594-96-first staging of William Shakespeare's Midsummer Night's Dream

1600-first reliable text printed of play

18th century-various operas were staged

1935-film-using Mendelssohn's music

1954-staged at the Met

The character of Bottom comes from the bottom or core of a skein upon which weaver's yarn was wound.

<u>Titania</u> is unknown in English folklore in <u>Ovid</u> it was another name for Circe.

Puck could have come from old wive's tales that Shakespeare heard in Stratford as a child. These go back to Anglo-Saxon times. An alternate name is Robin Goodfellow and he is found in Scot's <u>Discoveries</u> of Witchcraft-1584.

16. Androcles and the lion

lst century A.D.-Apion-Aiguptiaka

Aelian-De natura animalium

1912-George Bernard Shaw-play of same name

1938-James Daughtery-children's book-Andy and the Lion.

The story teller was Aulius Gellius and tells of Roman slave and the lion who was befriended and remembered at a later time.

17. Clara and the Nutcracker

1818-21-E.T.A. Hoffmann-in Die Serapionsbruder called The Nutcracker and the Mouse King-German

1892-Peter Slich Tchaikovsky-suite and ballet-first performed in St.

Petersburg as suite-called Nutcracker Suite

1892-ballet performed called <u>Casse-Noisette</u>

18. <u>Cinderella</u>

850-860 A.D.-Chinese book earliest datable version 1540-could be one of stories in Complaynt of Scotland 1697-retelling in well-known form by Charles or Pierre Perrault-in Histoires ou Contes du temps passe as 'Cendrillon, ou la petite pantouffle de verre' (French)

18. <u>Cinderella</u> (Continued)

1634-'La Gatta Cenerentola' (Italian)

1727-Madame d'Aulnoy's-'Finetta and the Cinder-girl' (English)

1817-Rossini-opera-La Cenerentala (Italian)

1878-found in Scotland by Andrew Lang in another form

1950-Disney animated film

1957-Rodger's and Hammerstein musical for T.V.

19. Jacob and Jacob's ladder

Biblical story-Jacob purchased his brother's birthright and served Rachel's father 14 years to win her hand-Genesis 24:34.

Jacob's ladder-Seen by Jacob in a dream-Genesis 28:12.

20. The crow and the water jug

Aesops Fables-tradionally the author was a Phrygian slave, but some were written before his time.

This particular fable tells of a crow who is half dead with thirst and finds a water jug with water in the bottom and adds pebbles to bring the water level up to get a drink and finally succeeds. "Little by little does the trick."

21. Peter Pan, Tinkerbelle, Wendy, Nana

1900-J.M. Barrie-book-Tommy and Grizel-mentions little lost boy who is happy not to grow up

1902-Barrie book-The Little White Bird-Peter appears in 6 chapters

1904-Barrie play produced in London-Peter Pan

1911-play Peter and Wendy put into story form

1950-Disney animated film

1955-Movie for T.V. starring Mary Martin

1976-Movie for T.V. starring Mia Farrow

It's possible that Barrie considered Peter Pan as autobiographical. His play-life was more real than "reality."

22. Moby Dick

1851-Herman Melville-book-American also called <u>The White Whale</u>. Study of good and evil, whale represents good. The book was forgotten at the time of Melville's death.

1930,1956-film versions of book

23. <u>Captain Ahab</u>

The antagonist in Melville's Moby Dick. He dies seeking revenge on the whale.

24. Scheherazade, Sinbad the Sailor and the Old Man of the Sea

9th century-first mention of the stories

9th century-16th century-various translations and additions.

24. Scheherazade, Sinbad the Sailor and the Old Man of the Sea (Continued)

These are medieval stories set in Central Asia. The dates are uncertain and it is thought that there are several authors.

Scheherazade-Shahrazad-King's wife who makes up the stories to keep from being killed.

Sinbad and Old man-characters in stories
1942-movie version of stories

25. Robinson Crusoe

1719-Daniel Defoe-book-<u>The Life and Strange Surprising Adventures of Robinson Crusoe of York, Mariner</u>-English
1720-Defoe-<u>In Serious Reflections of Robinson Crusoe</u>. Defoe claimed it was an allegory on his life.
1814-Swiss Family Robinson by Jonathon Wyss-a follower of Defoe.
It is also said that Defoe founded his original story on the adventures of Alexander Selkirk.
